MORBID APPEARANCES

*Gen appearance.* skin. 5 ft.

*Brain & its Membranes.* The convolutions were not perceptibly flattened. The veins were greatly engorged. Except of cerebro-spinal fluid. Found the vessels at the base & especially round the middle cerebral arteries were many small grey or yellowish-grey masses of tuberculous deposit. The largest of them were not greater than a pin's head. No excess of fluid in the ventricles.

*Lungs.* Their plural surfaces are quite rough from the presence of numerous dots of tubercle. The lungs were heavier than natural & of a redder color. The bronchi were inflamed. Dotted through the whole of both of them were ~~one~~ small, perfectly distinct masses of tuberculous deposit, each about the size of a pin's head and of a pearly hue.

*Heart.* Eng. Healthy.

*Peritoneum.* 8 or 10 loosely scattered masses of tubercle were found to invade the peritoneum, being especially thick over the Liver.

*Liver.* 2 lbs. 13 oz. Bile-stained & soft. In its substance was a considerable number of soft tubercular masses.

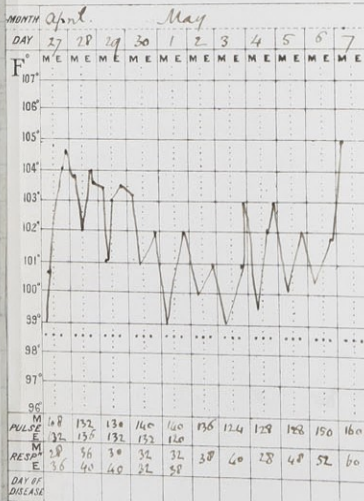
Tuberculosis of Pia Mater, Lungs, Liver, Spleen, Kidney & Peritoneum

CASE

*History.* No family history of tubercular disease, no previous history of any kind, except of measles, when she was a child. Measles appeared Oct 13; regular and normal since then. She had been for 6 months in hard work as a reading maid when she was taken ill. About a fortnight before admission she began to feel unwell, anorexia & thirst; no vomiting, no diarrhoea, no abdominal pain. A day or two later she noticed that her breath was very short, and the headache increased; she slept excellently, the days and went on with her work till 7 days before admission - of her subsequent condition no satisfactory evidence could be obtained beyond that she complained much of pain in her head, was drowsy and at times delirious.

*On Admission* April 27, Holland 2. A fairly nourished girl in a state of great prostration, somewhat drowsy and confused in mind. P. weak 100. Resp. very shallow 20.

*Tuberculosis of Six Months, Lungs, Liver, Spleen, Kidney & Peritoneum*

CASE

A day or two later she noticed that her breath was very short, and the headache increased: she slept excellently, the days and went on with her work till 7 days before admission - of her subsequent condition no satisfactory evidence could be obtained beyond that she complained much of pain in her head, was drowsy and at times delirious.

*April 27, Hford. 2.*      A fairly nourished girl in a state of great prostration, somewhat drowsy and confused in mind. P. weak 100. Resp. very shallow 20. Tongue dry, rough, reddish brown - no cough. Lungs, a few sharp crepitations throughout. Heart normal. Abdomen, distended by vanilla; not tender; fulcrum normal. Urine acid sp. gr. 1016 no albumen. Pupils, corneas, well marked. Pupils equal: no strabismus, & ocular abnormalities.

*Prognosis.*      She complains in a slow nasal voice of headache - Temp. 99°. She was treated with Calomel gr i l. 2 & Pot. Sod. gr x. Pot. Brom. gr x. ex Aqua dist. Sij. t. d. She grew very restless in the evenings and did not sleep: no screaming, no rigors. On the afternoon of 28<sup>th</sup> her breathing became irregular; the size of her pupils altered much at short intervals; there was no sweating or cough: one solid motion passed. On 29<sup>th</sup> the pupils became unequal, sometimes one sometimes the other the larger: action of light very sluggish: one eyeball moved slightly without the other and both were apt to move in jerks: there was slight inequality in the facial muscles: there was no complaint of pain, but her manner was very dull & heavy. After April 30 she sank into a semicomatose state with half-opened eyes from which she could at first be easily aroused; no photophobia: legs drawn up, head thrown a little back: no screaming, no vomiting. Her breathing grew more rapid & more regular: no cough, no convulsions. During the last two days of life there was ready constant groaning and deeper coma. She died about 10 am on May 7 in extreme typhoid - then very hot & dry.
